

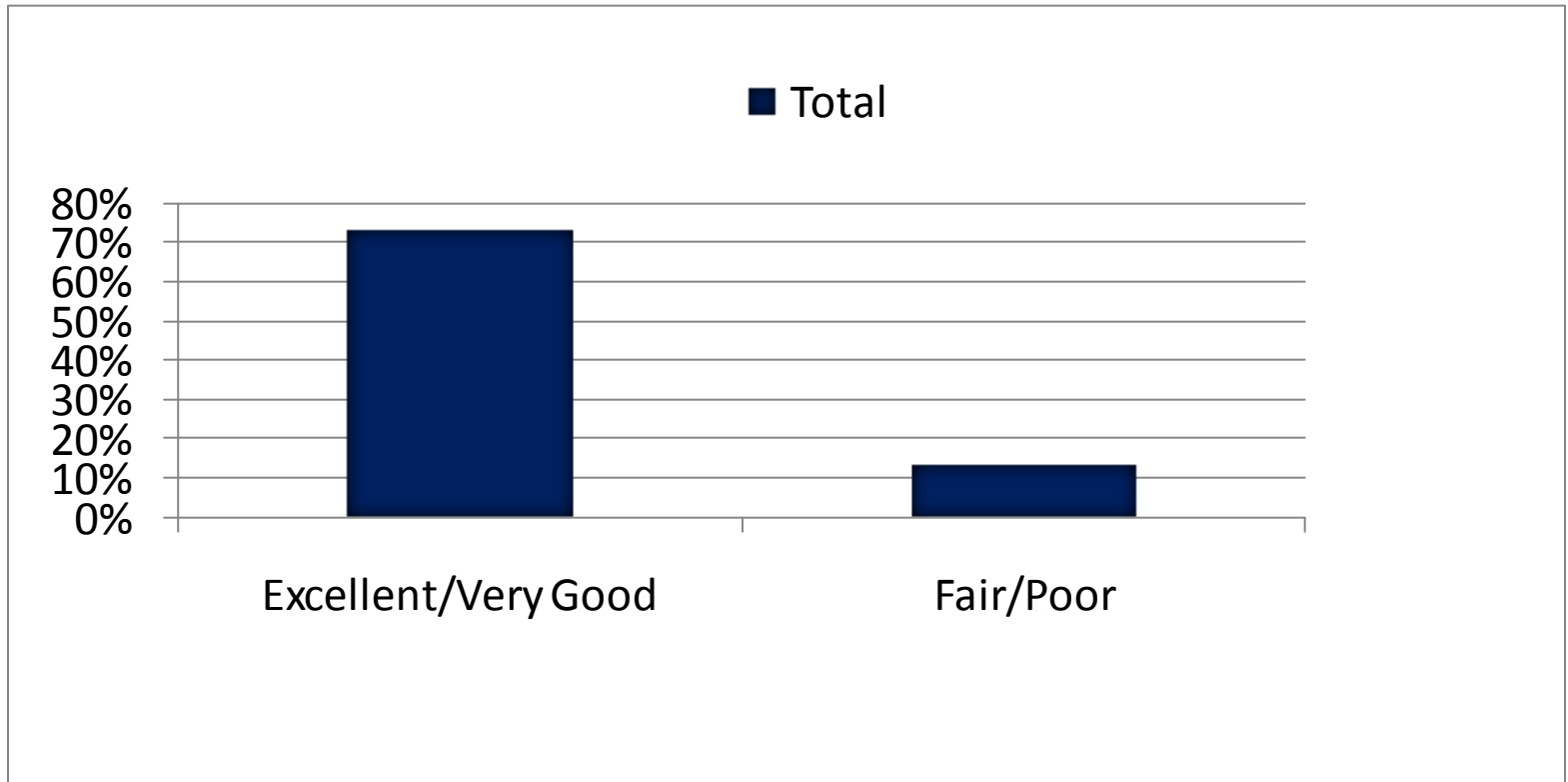

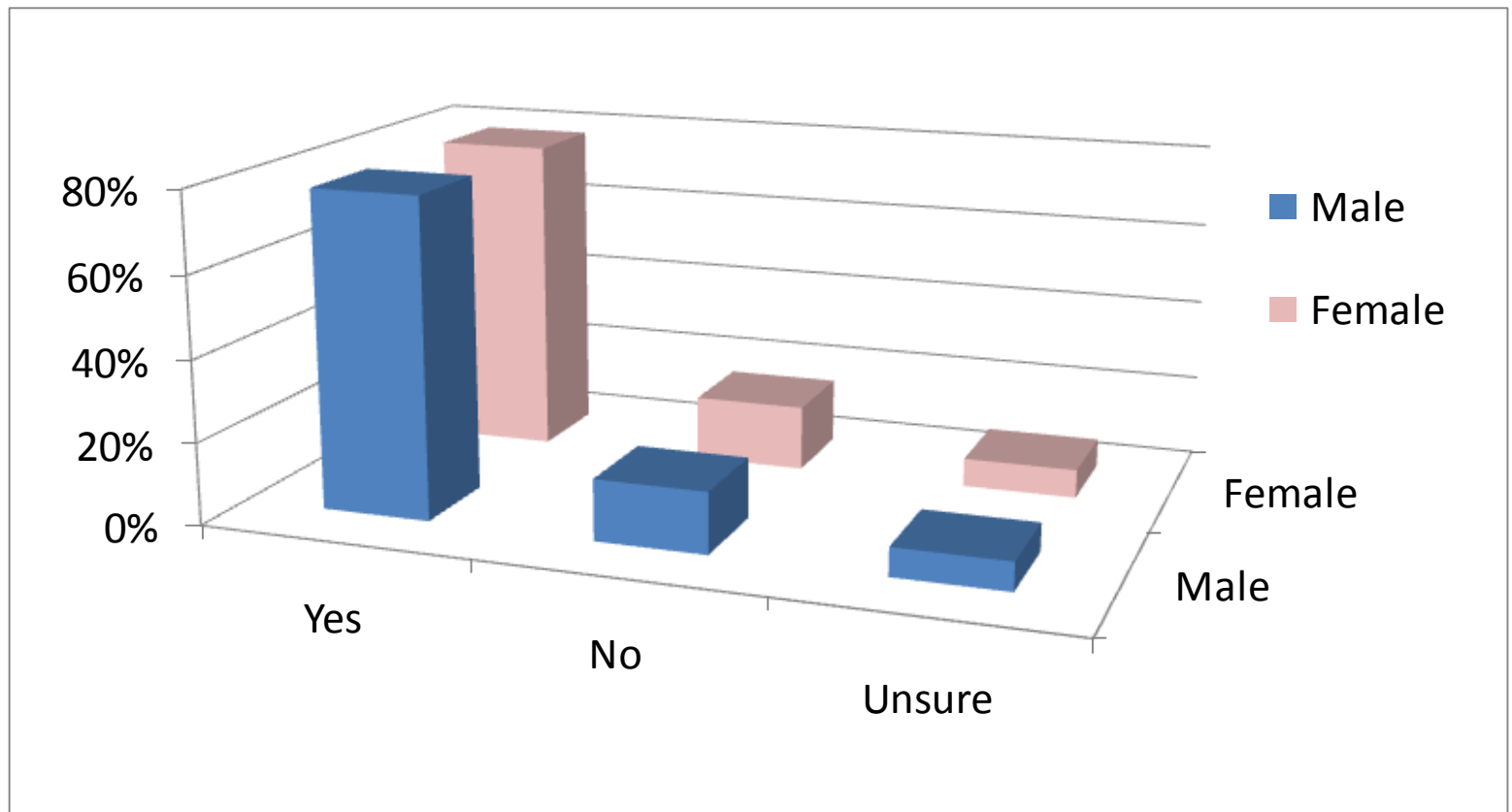
Marital Rating



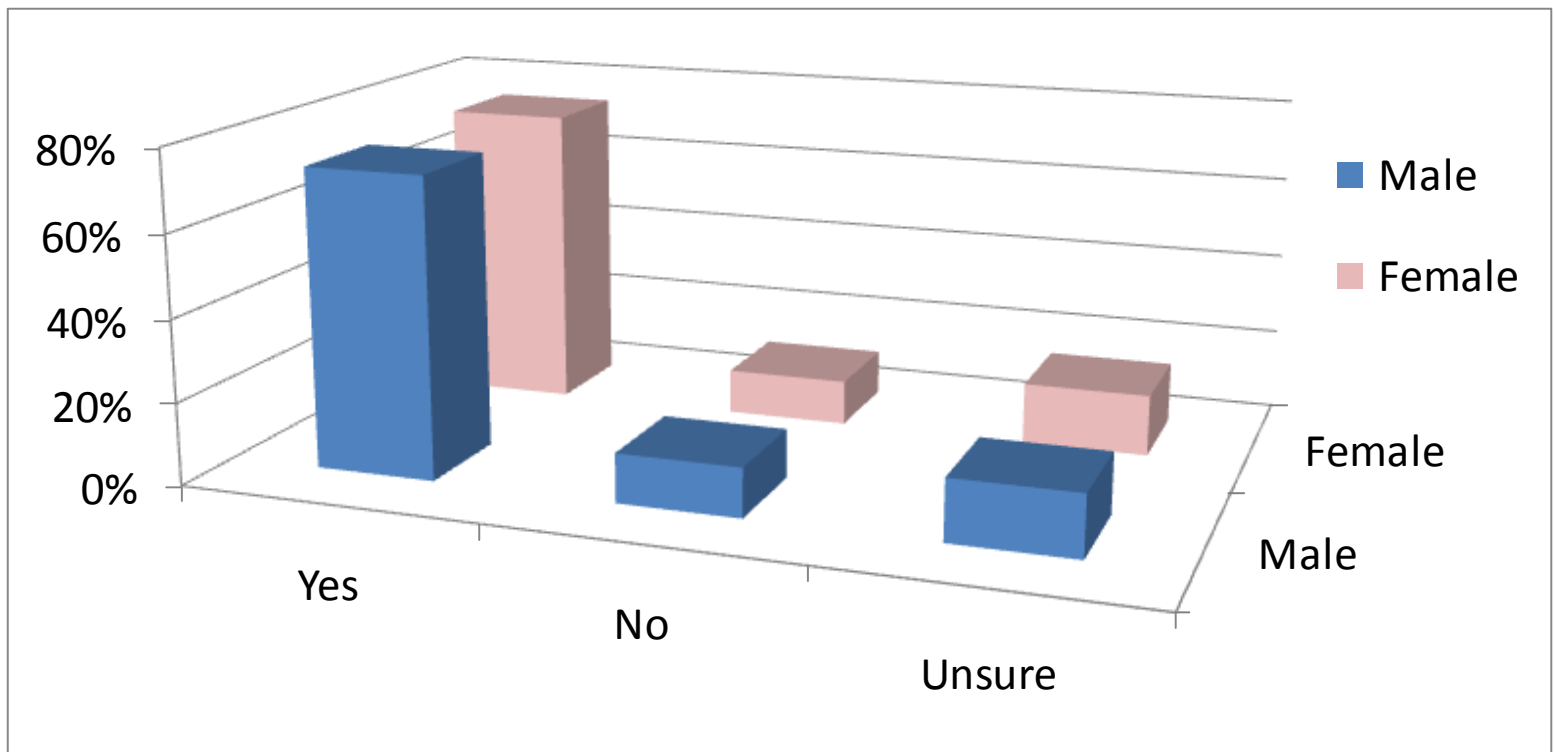
National Comparisons: NORC (General Social Survey)

- AMSS II Orthodox Jewish sample, percent rating marriage as excellent/very good:
 - Men= 72%
 - Women=74%
- Percentage of married U.S. adults who said that their marriages were very happy:
 - Men= 62.9%
 - Women=59.5%

Religious Couples Generally Have Happier Marriages

- “Many studies indicate that couples who participate regularly in religious activities (e.g. church attendance) report greater marital happiness and satisfaction and may be less likely to divorce compared to their less religious counterparts”

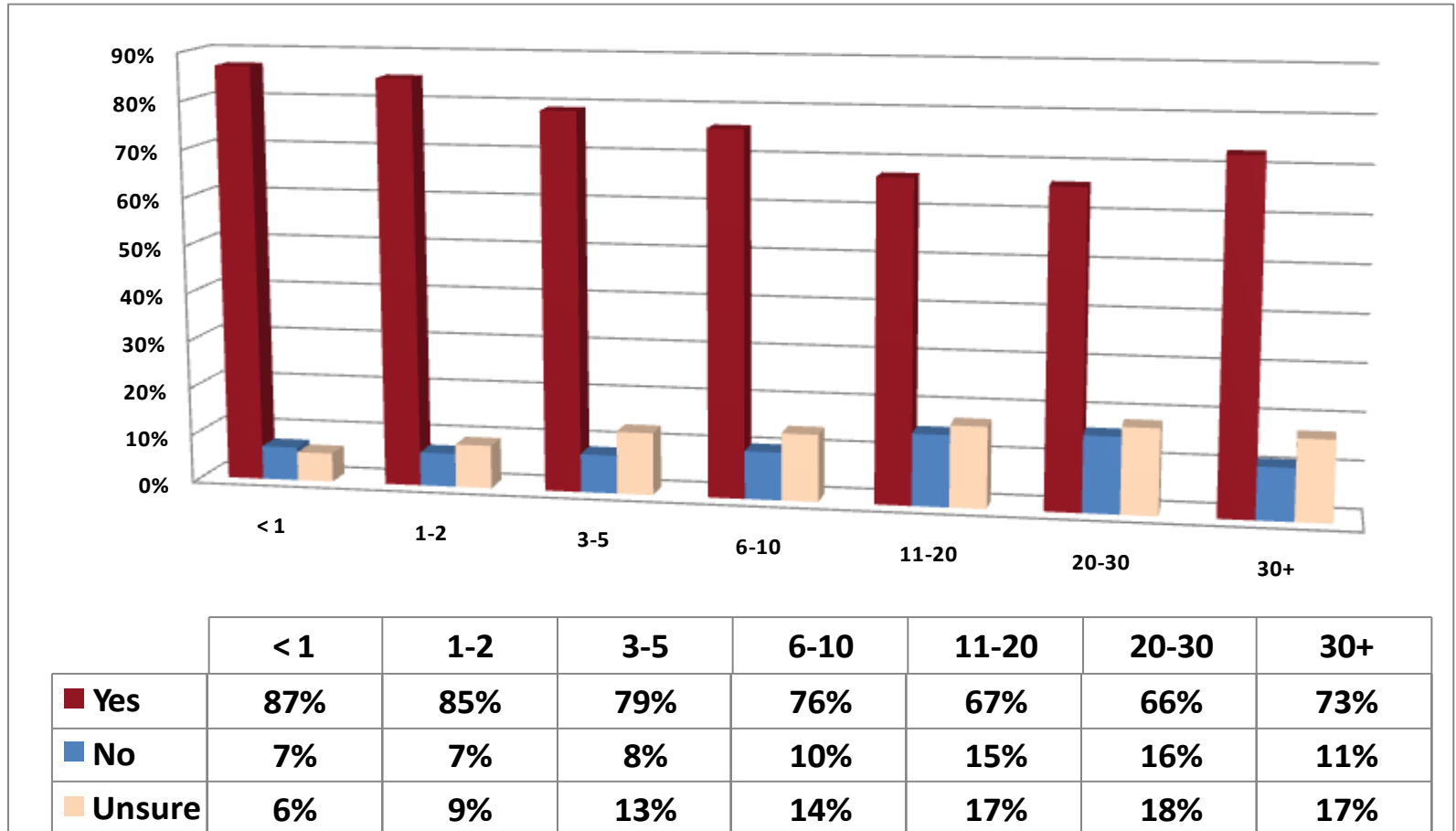

National Comparisons

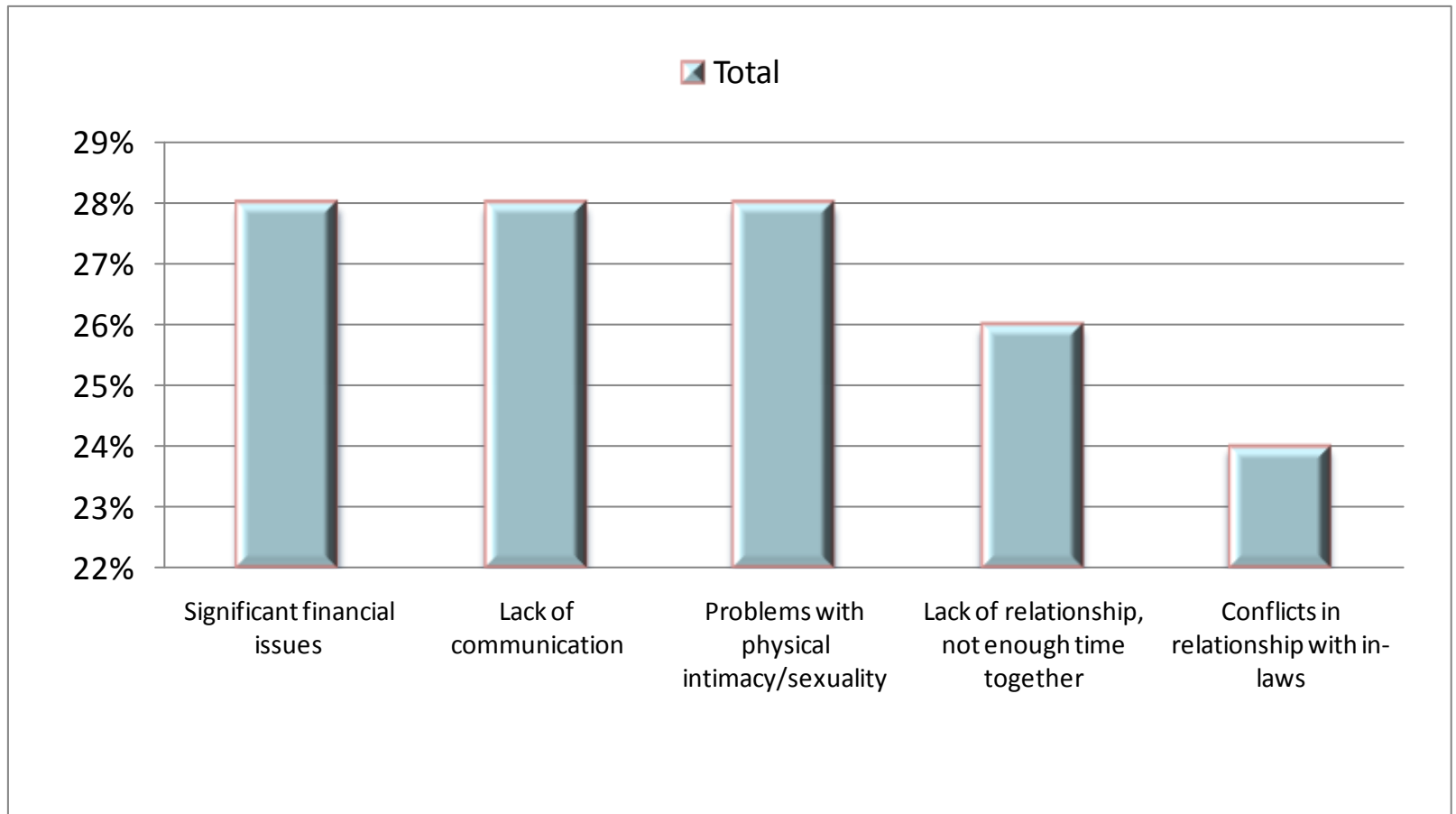
- The U-shaped curve found in our study is typical of marital research in the general community.
- “An analysis of two surveys of 8,929 men and women in first marriages found a U-shaped curve... During the first 20-24 years of marriage, the longer a couple have been married, the less satisfied they tend to be. Then the association between marital satisfaction and length of marriage begins to turn positive. At 35 to 44 years of marriage, a couple tend to be even more satisfied than during the first four years.”

Top Five Stressors: Personal/Familial (Extremely/Somewhat Stressful)



Stress Factors: Significant Financial Issues



Stress Factors: Lack of Communication



Stress Factors: Problem with Physical Intimacy/Sexuality



Stress Factors: Lack of relationship, Not Enough Time Together



Other Marital Stressors

Early Marriage ($p < .001$)

- Decisions about Birth Control
- Infertility
- Use of Inappropriate Internet Sites
- Excessive Time on the Internet

Later Marriage ($p < .001$)

- Medical Illness

Family Income and “Off the Derech” (at risk) Children

- Respondents with household income between \$25-50K reported significantly less stress from an “off the derech”(at-risk) child compared with those earning:
\$100-150K ($p < .05$)
\$150K and above ($p < .01$)
- The above noted trend is consistent with previous research finding higher risk in more affluent adolescents (Luthar, 2002)

Blended Families and “Off the Derech” (at risk) Children

- Divorced and remarried respondents are more likely to feel marital stress related to “off the derech”(at-risk) children, compared with those in first marriages.

Remarried:	mean = 1.57
First marriage:	mean = 1.24

Statistically Significant ($p < .001$)

First Marriages and Remarriages

- Respondents in first marriages report greater stress from conflicts with in-laws ($p < .001$).
- Divorced and remarried respondents report greater stress from financial issues ($p < .001$).

Baalei Teshuva and Stressors

- **Baalei Teshuva report greater marital stress from:**
 - At risk children ($p < .001$)
 - Conflicts regarding chinuch of children ($p < .001$)
 - Lack of communication ($p < .01$)
 - Relationship ($p < .001$)
 - Intimacy ($p < .01$)
 - Religious differences ($p < .001$)
 - Finances ($p < .001$)
 - Lack of social network ($p < .01$)

*Important note: Although statistically significant, the absolute differences were relatively small.

- **Friends** ($p < .01$)
 - Married 5 years or less: 32%
 - Married Over 30 years: 25%
